New Zealand Family Courts Focus on Counseling and Mediation

The Spring 1985 joint conference between 47 U.S. and Canadian AFCC members and an estimated 200 New Zealand Family Court personnel resulted in an increased understanding of the shared philosophies between countries and disciplines.

Specialization was introduced into the New Zealand
Court System as the result
of recommendations made by
the 1976 Royal Commission on
Courts. The District Court,
the court of first instance,
now divided into General,
y Trial, and Family Court
pecialty areas. In 1981,
18 Family Court Judges implemented a policy of assisting families in resolving disputes through the use
of counseling and mediation
services.

Parties may petition for a marriage dissolution following a two year separation based on irreconcilable differences. All applications for separation orders, and a majority of

custody, access, and guardianship disputes as well as applications for protection from domestic violence are referred to counseling by the Family Court Judge, Registrar, or Counseling Coordinator. Counseling Coordinator, assisted by the Marriage Guidance Council of New Zealand, staffed by volun-teers who donate 5 hours per week, provide counseling services to assist in the resolution of these issues. When counseling is completed the counselor advises the court of any understandings reached and the outatanding issues needing resolution.

Mediation conferences are chaired by the Family Court Judge. Legal counsel for the parties may be present upon request of the parties. A record is kept of the mediation conference setting forth agreements, consent orders, and unresolved matters. Apart from the record of agree-

ments, all matters discussed during the mediation conference are deemed confidential. The judge who chairs the mediation conference does not typically preside over any ultimate litigation.

The Family Court Act of 1980 states that Family Court proceedings shall be conducted in such a way to avoid unnecessary formality, and neither the judge nor legal counsel shall wear wigs or gowns. Most judges conduct dissolution hearings by personally questioning the parties while legal counsel take a less active role in the proceedings.

Participants in this first inter-continental exchange were left with a greater appreciation of the multi-cultural traditions of counseling and mediation services. We look forward to renewing our many friend-ships and a continued dialogue.

AFCC Receives California Mediation Planning Grant

AFCC has been retained by the Judicial Council of California to prepare an advance planning document for the implementation of Chapter 893, AB2445. This legislation, enacted on behalf of the California Chapter of AFCC, acknowledges the significant anges in the area of ily law in recent years, cluding joint custody and mediation, and the need for a state wide coordination of the application of these laws, a statistical reporting system regarding family

law matters, ongoing training for family law professionals and an evaluation of the effectiveness of present law. AFCC President Tim Salius and Technical Assistance Codirector Patrick Phear met with Administrative Office Staff and others in August to discuss needs unique to individual California counties. This exciting project highlights the expertise offered by AFCC in assisting various jurisdictions with the develop-ment and implementation of

legislation and court programs in the area of family law.

Legislative News

California - Effective July 29, 1985, AB100, tten and sponsored by the ifornia Chapter of AFCC, authorizes mediators and evaluators to request the appointment of an attorney for the child in any contested custody or visitation matter. The legislation allows Family Court Services Staff to seek intervention on behalf of a minor whenever it appears that the parents are unable or unwilling to address the child's needs and removes any impediments to such requests due to confidentiality provisions. Chapter 893, AB2445 will provide approximately \$600,000/year for the coordination of family court services, a uniform statistical and reporting system and... training and education. Fees in the amount of \$3.00 each for copies of divorce decrees and marriage licenses have been earmarked for these services. AFCC mbers, Hugh McIsaac and aae Ames, lent their pertise to this legis-lative effort and AFCC has been selected to provide, a preliminary planning report for implementation of the bill.

Florida - House Bill 756, to create standards for certification, renewal and discipline of mediators under the "Florida Family Mediation Practice Act" was defeated in committee. Senate Bills 1028 and 1037 attempting to establish similar certification provisions for mediators were also defeated in committee. It was felt that more time and thought was needed before such legislation could be effective.

Kansas - Senate Bill 33, effective July 1985, allows the court to appoint a mediator in contested child stody and visitation ters. The statute fines criteria for appointment of a mediator, the duties of the mediator, and conditions for termin-

ation of mediation. The mediation process is deemed to be confidential except where disclosure of information is required by law and holds that communication between the participants is privileged. The costs of mediation are to be shared by the parties in an equitable fashion.

Maine - Maine Public Law 1983, Chapter 813, effective July 1984, requires separating or divorcing parents of minor children to attempt mediation of any issue in dispute. The Court Mediation Service began in 1977 as an experiment in several Maine courts by providing voluntary mediation of small claims disputes. As a result of the new legislation, the Court Mediation Service has expended from 12 to 44 part-time mediators working in all of Maine's District and Superior Courts and handles the domestic relations mediation for the state. Attorneys are precluded from serving as court mediators. The new law also removes references in the statutes to sole custody, joint custody, and visitation rights and instead describes the elements of parental rights and responsibilities such as primary physical residence, parent-child contact. support, education, medical and dental care, religious upbringing, and travel boundaries and expenses.

Wisconsin - A special Committee on Custody Arrangements was appointed by the Legislative Council to study the use and effectiveness of joint custody and the implementation of mediation services to assist parents in resolving custody and visitation disputes. The Legislative Council draft WLCS 210/5 creates definitions for sole and joint legal custody and replaces the concept of visitation with "periods of physical placement." The draft also permits the court to order joint legal custody in

instances where only one parent is requesting joint custody and creates new standards for post-judgment changes in legal and physical custody. proposed legislation would require every county to make mediation services available to assist in the resolution of custody disputes and would require contesting parents to attend an initial mediation session to assess the appropriateness of mediation.

Dr. Isolina Ricci, provided a 1 day Advanced Family Mediation Seminar on September 20, 1985 in Oregon City, Oregon. The seminar was sponsored by the Clackamas County Family Court Service. It was attended by public and private sector mediators at the invitation of F. Nolan Jones, Director of the court service. Dr. Ricci demonstrated the cases of confluant mediation - a blend of therapeutic and educational intervention within mediation.

AFCC Chapter News

Arizona - Murray Bloom, Chapter and Regionalization Chairperson, will be meeting with AZ affiliate chapter members in October to assist with the completion of requirements for obtaining full chapter status.

California - Guided by Past-President Hon. Leonard Edwards of Santa Clara County and President Wallace Beasley, Fresno County, the California Chapter has heen actively working on legislation to improve family court matters. California Chapter has employed a lobbyist to assist with the enactment of legislation including a provision to allow custody mediations and evaluators to seek the appointment of legal counsel for minors in contested custody and visitation matters and the implementation of Chapter 893, AB2445 to provide a state wide coordination of family law legislation and a statistical reporting system. It is estimated that AB2445 will provide \$600,000/yr through court document fees. These funds will be earmarked for family court programs.

Florida - interest in the development of an AFCC Chapter in Florida is increasing. Staff from the

13 court-connected services will be meeting November 8-9 in Orlando to discuss common issues and to explore interest in an AFCC chapter. Recent legislative efforts in the area of mediation will also be discussed. For further information contact Ailene Hubert, Family Mediation/Conciliation Program, 507 SE 6th Street, 2nd Floor, Ft. Kansas - Judge Herbert Walton, District Judge of Johnson County, Kansas has contacted AFCC to inquire about a Kansas Chapter. Kansas' recently enacted mediation legislation has prompted considerable interest in the development of public and private services for divorcing families.
